

Vicar's five-minute reflection GRATITUDE IS TO BE EXPRESSED

I read about a story from Youth Specialities, of two old friends who bumped into one another on the street one day. One man looked very sad and discouraged, almost on the verge of tears. His friend asked, "What has the world done to you, my old friend?" The sad fellow said, "Three weeks ago, a rich uncle of mine died. To my surprise, he included me in his will. His lawyers sent me a cheque for \$40,000!" "That's terrific," said the friend. "That's a lot of money."

"Yes, but two weeks ago, they sent me another cheque—this time for \$100,000!" "Wow, that's incredible!" said the friend. "You've really been blessed!" "You don't understand," the man whined. "Last week I got another cheque in the mail that was larger than the first two. It was for a quarter of a million dollars!"

The friend was getting very confused. "You're right, I don't understand. Why then are you so unhappy? Why do you look so glum?" "Because this week I haven't received anything," came the reply.

Sometimes we are so blessed that we begin to think we're entitled to all the good things that come our way. Perhaps it's human nature. If you give a small child a gift, he'll treasure it. But if you give him two gifts, he might wonder why he didn't get a third.

What happens when you lose things you've come to expect? What happens when there's a power outage and you can't watch TV or operate your hair dryer? What happens when you get sick and can't do some of the things that you'd planned? If you're like most people, you probably become resentful and angry. You don't realize that the things you have are privileges, not rights. They are the blessings from God. None of us deserves the things we have. We live very comfortably while people all over the world suffer. We take for granted things that other people have never experienced.

Yet we still feel like we don't have enough. We want more. And we aren't very grateful for what we do have. That's why it's important for us to practise an attitude of gratitude. We need to take time every day to thank God for the blessings he gives us (Colossians 3:15). When you're thankful for what you have, you'll be able to live every day with joy—whether you get

The commentator Matthew Henry, while reflecting on the fact that someone had stolen His wallet, prayed like this: 'First, Lord, let me be thankful that I had never been robbed before. Second that the thief did not take my life. Third, that because he took all I had possessed it was not much, and fourth, because it was he who robbed and not me.' There is never a time in anyone's life when there is nothing for which to be thankful. So, let me encourage you to think - and give thanks.

Gratitude is to be expressed. We are commanded to "give thanks." Now that is excellent advice because a grateful person will be a happier person; a grateful person will be a healthier person; a grateful person will be a holier person. But this is more than just good advice. It is a command. Gratitude is not an option, it is an obligation. It is a sin to be ungrateful.

So, like many wives before me, I ignored advice books and set about improving him. My nagging only made his behaviour worse: he'd drive faster instead of slower; shave less frequently, not more; leave his reeking bike grab on the bedroom floor longer than ever.

A breakthrough came when Amy went to a school for exotic animal trainers in California to research a book. She wrote:

ISRAEL GRANTS RESIDENCY TO JERUSALEM'S ANGLICAN BISHOP

In a statement to his supporters, Bishop Dawani Suheil said: "It is with great pleasure, and with God's help, that I and my family have received our Residency Permits"... "I want to thank all of you, my friends and colleagues throughout the Anglican Episcopal Communion and the Worldwide Christian Community, for your continued support throughout this time..."

Bishop Suheil was denied the renewal of his Residency Permit by the government in August last year. Initially he had sought confidential support through religious and diplomatic channels...After many months of little success, Bishop Dawani resorted to the law and his legal advisor sent a letter to the Attorney General of Israel seeking an explanation of the allegations against him which had been the basis for the denial of the residency rights for himself and his family. What it was that finally resulted in him and his family being granted the Residency Permits has not been revealed.

CHRISTIAN NEWS AROUND THE WORLD

Speak out for Algerian Christians' right to believe

All Karim Siaghi did was give his neighbour a Christian CD. Now this Algerian Christian has a five-year prison sentence hanging over him.

Karim also received a fine of 200,000 Algerian dinars (approx. £1,700). Just days before the Governor of Béjaïa Province ordered all churches of the Protestant Church of Algeria in his area to close. These are the latest incidents seriously violating Algerian Christians' right to freedom of religion.

In recent years an Algerian law which regulates the religious activities of non-Muslims has been used to justify the detention of Christians and orders to close churches. Ordinance 06-03 prohibits any Christian activity from taking place outside of state-recognised church buildings, and bans evangelistic material and attempts to evangelise Muslims. Breaking the law can result in fines of up to one million dinars (£8,370) and a maximum of five years in prison.

Algerian believers themselves have protested about Ordinance 06-03. Now they are asking you to add your voice to help reach a critical mass that the authorities cannot ignore.

Please write today to the Algerian Ambassador, Mr Mohammed Salah Dembri, expressing your concern about Karim's sentence and urging the Algerian authorities to rescind Ordinance 06-03.

Thank you for using your voice to speak out for our Algerian brothers and sisters' right to believe. Please pray that through this campaign there will be greater freedom of religion for Algerian Christians.

BIBLE TRANSLATOR WILLIAM TYNDALE STRANGLED AND BURNED

How many Bibles do you have in your house? For most of us, Bibles are easily accessible, and many of us have several. That we have the Bible in English owes much to William Tyndale, sometimes called the Father of the English Bible. 90% of the King James Version of the Bible and 75% of the Revised Standard Version are from the translation of the Bible into English made by William Tyndale,



yet Tyndale himself was burned at the stake for his work on October 6, 1536.

Back in the fourteenth century, John Wycliffe was the first to make (or at least oversee) an English translation of the Bible, but that was before the invention of the printing press and all copies had to be hand written. Besides, the church had banned the unauthorized translation of the Bible into English in 1408.

Over one hundred years later, however, William Tyndale had a burning desire to make the Bible available to even the common people in England. After studying at Oxford and Cambridge, he joined the household of Sir John Walsh at little Sudbury Manor as tutor to the Walsh children. Walsh was a generous lord of the manor and often entertained the local clergy at his table. Tyndale often added spice to the table conversation as he was confronted with the Biblical ignorance of the priests. At one point Tyndale told a priest, "If God spare my life, ere many years pass, I will cause a boy that driveth the plough shall know more of the Scriptures than thou dost."

It was a nice dream, but how was Tyndale to accomplish this when translating the Bible into English was illegal? He went to London to ask Bishop Tunstall if he could be authorized to make an English translation of the Bible, but the bishop would not grant his approval.

However, Tyndale would not let the disapproval of men stop him from carrying out what seemed so obviously God's will. With encouragement and support of some British merchants, he decided to go to Europe to complete his translation, then have it printed and smuggled back into England. (continued on page 14)

In 1524 Tyndale sailed for Germany. In Hamburg he worked on the New Testament, and in Cologne he found a printer who would print the work. However, news of Tyndale's activity came to an opponent of the Reformation who had the press raided. Tyndale himself managed to escape with the pages already printed and made his way to the German city Worms where the New Testament was soon published. Six thousand copies were printed and smuggled into England. The bishops did everything they could to eradicate the Bibles -- Bishop Tunstall had copies ceremoniously burned at St. Paul's; the archbishop of Canterbury bought up copies to destroy them. Tyndale used the money to print improved editions!


King Henry VIII, then in the throes of his divorce with Queen Katherine, offered Tyndale a safe passage to England to serve as his writer and scholar. Tyndale refused, saying he would not return until the Bible could be legally translated into English. Tyndale continued hiding among the merchants in Antwerp and began translating the Old Testament while the King's agents searched all over England and Europe for him.



Tyndale was finally found by an Englishman who pretended to be his friend but then turned him over to the authorities. After a year and a half in prison, he was brought to trial for heresy -- for believing, among other things, in the forgiveness of sins and that the mercy offered in the gospel was enough for salvation. In August 1536, he was condemned; on October 6, 1536 he was strangled and his body burned at the stake. His last prayer was "Lord, open the King of England's eyes." The prayer was answered in part when three years later, in 1539, Henry VIII required every parish church in England to make a copy of the English Bible available to its parishioners.
