Vicar's reflection on Luke 2:13-14 GLORY TO GOD IN THE HIGHEST...

Every year, we say we're going to cut back, simplify, and have a family Christmas that focuses on the real reason for the season—Jesus. But every year, advertisements beckon, the children plead, and it seems easier just to indulge our wants and whims. Overspending, overeating, materialism,

and busyness rob us of our peace and joy and rob Jesus of his rightful role as the centre of our celebration.

This Christmas, cut through the hype that leaves you exhausted and broke at the end of the year. Instead, experience the peace of knowing that God is truly with us, the joy of giving sacrificially, and the love of a Saviour who gave everything he had for us.

A number of years ago a story appeared which told of a man who picked up a beautiful rock from a North Carolina stream bed and used it as his cabin doorstop. Years later a geologist who was hiking in the area stopped at the cabin and noticed the doorstop, which he immediately recognized as a huge lump of gold. In fact, it proved to be one of the largest gold nuggets ever found east of the Rockies. Imagine having a huge nugget of gold at your doorstep and not knowing or recognizing it! In the same way, many people did not and do not recognize the glory and value and worth of Jesus.

However, the angels of Christmas Day did not have this problem. They knew exactly who it was in the manger. They understood the being and the person and the mission of the baby born in Bethlehem. As the angel himself put it, "Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is Christ the Lord."

Who is that baby in the manger? He is the One spoken of by the prophets. He is the covenant heir of Abraham and the promised son of David. He is Emmanuel – God with us. He is Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace. He is the newborn King. He is the Suffering Servant who was pierced for our transgressions and crushed for our iniquities. To sum up, He is the Messiah – the promised, looked for, longed for, and prayed for Messiah.

I am amazed that the angels sang "Glory to God in the highest." I am amazed by this because Christ did not leave His throne in heaven for the sake of the angels. When Satan rebelled against God and dragged a third of the angels with him Christ did not come down from heaven to save them; instead... (continued next page)



He put them into gloomy dungeons to be held for judgment. He did not take on the form of an angel to save the angels but He took on our flesh to save us.

Yet, the angels sang because of the birth of our Saviour and Lord. They stretched their wings and sped from their bright seats above to tell humble shepherds the good news and marvellous story of God in the flesh.

Throughout the course of history the angels have witnessed many mighty works of God. They saw the planets fashioned by the hands of God and put into the immensity of space. At that time, says Job, the morning stars sang together and all the angels shouted for joy (Job 38:7). But now they sing when they see God descend from heaven to earth and become a baby, and hang upon a woman's breast for milk. "Glory to God in the highest."

This tells us that salvation is God's highest glory. We know that God is glorified in every flower that blooms, every bird that sings, every bee that buzzes, every frog that croaks. God is praised in and by every creature in the heavens, on the earth, and in the sea from the least to the greatest. All of creation sings of its Creator's might. But none of this praise can begin to compare to the glory and majesty given Him because of the birth of the Saviour and Lord in Bethlehem. "Glory to God in the highest." God's wisdom, God's power, God's love, God's faithfulness, God's mercy, God's justice all reach their highest expression in the baby in the manger who becomes the man on the cross. The whole of God is glorified in Christ.

Though creation may be a majestic organ of praise, it cannot reach the compass of the golden canticle—Incarnation! What power, that Godhead should unrobe itself and become man! Behold, what *love* is thus revealed to us when Jesus becomes a man. The whole of God is glorified in Christ; and though some part of the name of God is written in the universe, it is here best read—in Him who was the Son of Man, and, yet, the Son of God.

The only glad tidings that made the angels sing, are those that put God first, God last, God in the middle, and God without end, in the salvation of his creatures. But, now, they sang as it were a new song before the throne of God: for they added this stanza—"on earth, peace." They did not sing that in the garden because there was more than peace there; for there was glory to God there.

It exposes our innermost thoughts and desires. Nothing in all creation is hidden from God. CHALLENGES IN CHRISTMAS PREACHING

1. Putting the Christ back into "Xmas"

by focusing on the real events and significance of Christmas. We don't want to appear killjoys by criticising all the trappings of Christmas, but we do want to emphasise that they are the trimmings – and not the reality. However, even when we focus on the events of the first Christmas we face a further challenge:

2. Separating fact from tradition

Christmas carols reveal the confusion about Christmas:

- was Jesus born "In the bleak midwinter" where "snow had fallen snow on snow"?
- was he born on "a silent night" where "all is calm, all is bright., sleeping in heavenly rest" or should we "See him a-lying on a bed of straw, a draughty stable with an open door"?
- more seriously, was it "certain poor shepherds in fields as they lay a-keeping their sheep" who "looked up and saw a star as it shone in the east beyond them far"?
- And "by the light of that same star" did "three wise men come from country far", following hard on the heels of the shepherds? (so that not only was there no room in the inn but little room in the crowded stable with Mary, Joseph and baby, shepherds, wise men, and assorted animals).

If we are going to preach Christ at Christmas faithfully and accurately, we need to get the facts straight with some careful examination of the texts. And when we do we may be able to convey a fresh appreciation of Christmas. But there is a third challenge of preaching Christ at Christmas:

3. Utilising the Biblical materials on Christmas

As you will know, only two of the gospels (Matthew and Luke) give any details about the birth of Jesus (at a rough count around 7% of the material in the four gospels) – and this presents a real challenge to the busy pastor who may be expected not only to preach two or three times at Christmas Sunday services, but is also called on to give a talk (usually very brief) at several other Christmas events.

I saw another cartoon recently, in which two church members were discussing their pastor: "Oh, he is a very green pastor, he recycles his sermons!" Well, even the greenest pastor struggles to recycle the stories of ... (continued next page)

the shepherds and the wise men, year after year! But not only a fresh look at these birth narratives, but also exploring other parts of Scripture, may reveal new treasures to be mined in preaching Christ at Christmas.

Some years ago (in Glasgow I think) I heard the American pastor Dale Ralph Davis preach on 2 Kings 11:1-3 – the account of how Athaliah, the Queen Mother, wiped out all the royal seed after the death of her son Ahaziah – well, almost all, for Aunt Jehosheba took and hid Joash the king's young son – and so preserved the promised line. Davis entitled the sermon, "The woman who saved Christmas"

I've just been reading (and would highly recommend) his book "The Word became fresh – how to preach from Old Testament narrative texts". In it, he tells how, on the Sunday before one Christmas, he preached on the long lists of genealogies in 1 Chronicles 1-9 under the title, "A Whole Bunch of Dead Folks for Christmas"!

Let me mention one final challenge (and I am sure there are more) in preaching Christ at Christmas – the challenge of what we might summarize as:

4. Connecting the crib to the cross

Of course, we know that the baby born in Bethlehem is the man born to die outside Jerusalem. But most people don't connect the blissful image of a baby in a manger with the bloody image of a crucified man – and they don't want to.

The song "Do they know it's Christmas?" went to number 1 (twice, in 1984 and again in 2004) but you can hardly imagine a few dozen pop-stars singing (or selling) a song entitled, "Do they know it's Easter?" But it's essential that we explain the connection between the crib and the cross.

So, in summary, these are:


DON'T SPOIL OUR FUN

But, now, man had fallen, and since the day when cherubim with fiery swords drove out the man, there had been no peace on earth, except in the hearts of some believers, who had obtained peace from the living fountain of this incarnation of Christ. Wars had raged from the ends of the world; men had slaughtered one another. There had been wars within as well as wars without. Satan had tormented man with thoughts of sin. There had been no peace on earth since Adam fell. But, now, when the newborn King made his appearance, the swaddling band with which he was wrapped up was the white flag of peace. That manger was the place where the treaty was signed, whereby warfare should be stopped between man's conscience and himself, man's conscience and his God.

It was then, that day, the trumpet blew—"Sheathe the sword, oh man, sheathe the sword, oh conscience, for God is now at peace with man, and man at peace with God." Do you not feel it my brothers and sisters, that the gospel of God is peace to man? Where else can peace be found, but in the message of Jesus? A few more years, and the world shall understand as it sees why angels sang; and he that will come shall come, and will not delay. Christ the Lord will come again, and when he comes he shall cast the idols from their thrones; he shall reign from pole to pole, and establish his peace all over the world.

And, then, they wisely ended their song with a third note. Some picture him as if he were some abstract substance taking no interest in our affairs. Sing, shout out loud because God has "good will toward us," so much so that he said it with an oath too, "As I live, says the Lord, I have no pleasure in the death of him that dies, but had rather that he should turn unto me and live." And if you say, "Lord, how shall I know that you have this good will towards me," he points to the Bethlehem manger, and says, "Sinner, if I had not a good will towards you, would I have parted... with my Son? if I had not good will towards the human race, would I have given up my Son to become one of that race that he might by so doing redeem them from death?"

I wish everybody that keeps Christmas this year, would keep it as the angels kept it - not with drinking orgies, unbridled merriment and the boisterousness of sin. Let us labour if we can to make peace next Christmas day. Let the old gentleman, who won't forgive his offending son fetch him at Christmas. Let us make peace in our family and in our church. Let not the sun go down on your anger. If you do not make the matter up today, or tomorrow, do it on that day. That is the way to keep Christmas. And if you have anything on your conscience, that prevents your having peace of mind, keep your Christmas by praying to God to give you peace in yourself. And when the Lord Jesus has become your peace, remember, there is another thing, *good will* towards others.

If you have the means, do something to clothe the naked, and feed the hungry, and make glad the mourner. Remember, it is good will towards men and women. Try, if you can, to show good will at this special season; and if you will do that, the poor will say with me, that indeed they wish there were six Christmases in the year.

Let each one of us go from this place determined, that if we are angry all the year round, this next week shall be an exception; that if we have snarled at everybody last year, this Christmas time we will strive to be kindly affectionate to others; and if we have lived all this year at enmity with God, I pray that by his Spirit he may this week give us peace with him; and then, indeed, it will be the merriest Christmas we ever had in all our lives.

Go home to your friends, and tell them what the Lord has done for you, and that will make a blessed round of stories at the Christmas fire. If you, young people will each tell your parents how the Lord met with you in the house of prayer; and have now come back to love your mother's God, and read your father's Bible, oh, what a happy Christmas that will make! What more shall I say? May God give you peace with yourselves; may he give you good will towards all your friends, your enemies, and your neighbours; and may he give you grace to give glory to God in the highest.

NO CRIB, NO CROSS

On Christmas day what are we celebrating? A God who humbled Himself, a young couple who clung to one another, a motley group of lowly shepherds. All this, and more. Angels who sang in the heavens, wise men who followed a star and the humble babe lying in a manger from which animals normally ate. Now you may ask: what is the point? Jana's parents could see the shepherds fidgeting in one corner of the stage which was evidently intended to be a field. Mary and Joseph stood solemnly behind the manger. In the back three young wise men waited impatiently. But still little Jana sat quietly and confidently.

Then the teacher began: "A long time ago, Mary and Joseph had a baby and they named Him Jesus," she said. "And when Jesus was born, a bright star appeared over the stable."

At that cue, Jana got up from her chair, picked up a large tinfoil star, walked behind Mary and Joseph and held the star up high for everyone to see.

When the teacher told about the shepherds coming to see the baby, the three young shepherds came forward and Jana jiggled the star up and down excitedly to show them where to come. When the wise men responded to their cue, she went forward a little to meet them and to lead the way, her face as alight as the real star might have been.

The playlet ended. They had refreshments. On the way home Jana said, with great satisfaction, "I had the main part!" "You did?" her Mom asked, wondering why she thought that. "Yes," she said, "'cause I showed everybody how to find Jesus!"
