# Vicar's ten - minute reflection MASTER, THE TEMPEST IS RAGING

I love Easter celebrations and somehow I struggle to find a reason for it. Is it because of the unpressured atmosphere where I do not have to buy gifts and send cards to "everybody" in the planet? Is it because of the absence of "gate-crashers", sorry, the commercial enterprises, which

are ever ready to highjack my Christian festivals and turn them into a winterval or a yuletide or whatever! To a large extent, Easter is not popular. Why? Because Easter is about the resurrection of a Man that was despised by the world. Easter is about God writing the epilogue to the life of His Son who came to redeem fallen mankind. Easter is the closing chapter of the Book that had its preface in Christmas, its penultimate page on Good Friday and its conclusion on Easter Day. Easter is about God speaking through the experiences of Jesus that He loves the world still, in spite of the rage and rejection of His great Gift in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. St. Paul rightly captures the experience of the world in their rejection of Jesus Christ. He says in 1 Corinthians 1:18: "For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."

Yes we are saved, and we are being saved. We are saved from our sins and are being saved from the powers of evil which brings fright to us many times in our journey as Christians. That was the experience of the disciples as they sailed in the same boat with Jesus while He was here physically on earth. He had instructed them to "go over the other side" (Matthew 8:18). He knew the storm was coming, yet he decided to launch out to sea. What is so significant is that with Jesus in the boat, the storms still raged and instilled fear in the disciples.

A simpleton would have surmised that since it was Jesus who gave the instruction that they should launch out to sea, there should be no opposition of any kind. That is a lie of the devil which he had sold to many gullible people to give them a reason to capitulate when the going gets tough-when reverses of life come their way- and they come to the wrong conclusion that God is not real or that it is useless to trust in Jesus. The Lord never promised we will never see a storm in life (as a matter of fact, He has told us to expect trouble, John 16:33). Rather, He has promised that He will be with us in the storm. -->p3



He will never leave His children alone in the midst of trouble; with perseverance they will overcome (Deuteronomy 31:8; James 1:12)

We are unsure of which of the apostles were with Christ in the boat, it's probable that seasoned fishermen (at least four of the twelve) were aboard. These men were quite familiar with the ways of the sea; certainly, this was not their first squall on the Sea of Galilee, which was known for its sudden raging storms. Even these professional fishermen were frightened by this storm, to the point of fearing they would die (Luke 8:24). And Jesus was fast asleep. He was at peace with the raging storms because His Father was in control of His destiny and no storm could truncate the work of redemption he had come to do. This is why Jesus, when He was awakened, rebuked the disciples with the question "Have you still no faith?" (Mark 4:40).

The storm created a situation where the apostles were in danger of drowning, and this produced anxiety in their minds. "Master, Master, we are perishing!" In like manner, the various storms that we face in life have the potential of causing anxiety or worry in our minds as well. Jesus warned about those who would allow the Word to be choked by the cares of this life (Luke 8:14). How can we learn to cope with such anxieties as they arise? To begin, we must learn to trust in God no matter what (Matthew 6:25-34). Even when it may seem that we lack even food and clothing, we must remember that God cares for us and will provide. This is not always an easy thing to do, but putting our lives completely in the hands of almighty God will help to cut down on worry.

The apostles' lack of faith reminds us that even those who lived and walked with Jesus, saw His miracles, and heard His message still found it difficult to be 100 percent faith-filled all the time. In that way, the disciples were a lot like us. However, their lack of faith was rebuked—and, by extension, so is ours. If Jesus was able to rescue the apostles from the storm, He is also able to rescue us from the storms of everyday life.

This reminds us that, "Man who is born of woman is of few days and full of trouble" (Job 14:1). Just as the disciples found themselves in the midst of a terrible storm, so we often face stormy trials and tribulations in life. -->p6

## **TILL DEATH DO US PART**

"Till death do us part" is the famous vow in the standard Christian marriage rite. This presupposes the idea of 'forever' marriage to or even beyond death which requires faith in the Lord Jesus Christ and a commitment to make it work.



That leads us to the question, "What does being committed to your marriage really mean?" When people say, 'I'm committed to my relationship,' they can mean several things, two of which are: 'I really like this relationship and want it to continue,' or 'I am committed to this relationship, but it's not going very well — I need to have some resolve, make some sacrifices and take the steps I need to take to keep this relationship moving forward. It's not just that I like the relationship, which is true, but that I'm going to step up

and take active steps to maintain this relationship, even if it means I'm not going to get my way in certain areas.' This latter kind of commitment shows clearly the difference be- in difficult times tween 'I like this relationship and I'm committed to it' and 'I'm committed to doing what it takes to make this relationship work.' When you and your partner are struggling a bit, are you going to do what's difficult when you don't want to? At 2 a.m., are you going to feed the baby?

The very act of communicating can be as important as the outcome of the conversation.

The couples that were willing to make sacrifices within their relationships were more effective in solving their problems. The second kind of commitment usually produces lower divorce rates and slower rates of deterioration in the relationship. I am not saying it's easy but it is worth every effort.

What we are saying in essence is that real commitment to your marriage will require you to do what it takes to make the relationship successful. In a long-term relationship, both parties cannot always get their way. When a couple has a dispute, they have many choices of how to respond.

One choice is "If you dig your heels in, then I can dig my heels in too. I can say, 'You're wrong. Listen to me!". But if this relationship is really important to you, -->p5

you will be willing to say: "I will compromise.' What is my goal? Is it to win this battle?" Is it to preserve the relationship? The behaviours I might engage in to win this conflict are different from those that are best for the relationship. The people who think more about protecting the relationship over the long term are more likely to think this is not that big a problem.

When the stakes are high, our relationships are vulnerable. When we're under a great deal of stress or when there is a high-stakes decision on which you disagree, those are defining moments in a relationship. What usually works is that committing to the relationship rather than committing to your own agenda and your own immediate needs is a far better strategy.

Find ways to compromise, or at least have the conversation that allows you and your partner to see things eye to eye. Often, we don't have the big conversations that we need in our relationship. The very act of communicating in difficult times can be as important as the outcome of the conversation. The couples whose marriages lasted were better at this than the couples who

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end up divorced. Those who ended their marriages would have said they were very committed to the marriage, but they did not have the resolve to say, 'Honey, we need to work on this; it's going to be hard, but it's important.' The successful couples were able to shift their focus away from whether 'I win' or 'you win' to 'Are we going to keep this relationship afloat?' That is the ideal.

In a marriage, disagreement is inevitable, but conflict is optional — a choice we make. "Bank-account relationships," in which you keep score of how often you get your way and how often you compromise is a spoiler. Experience has shown that a healthy marriage is where the two people involved are forgiving of the behaviour of each other and not in the habit of demanding that a spouse change his or her behaviour. If it is so easy for you to tell your husband/wife to change, perhaps you should just change yourself. Go ahead and take that on, see how it goes. D.A.

Some of these storms are just the natural result of living on this sin-cursed earth.

We may experience problems of physical health, as Paul did in 2 Corinthians 12:7-10. We will likely have to deal with the sorrow caused by the deaths of loved ones, as did Mary and Martha when their brother Lazarus died in John 11:17-35. Some of our storms could be related to sickness, job loss, marriage problems, death (1 Corinthians 15:55), and even the sting of being labelled "the odd fellas" of the society because we do not conform to its standards. Let us remember what the Bible says: "Yes, and all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution" (2 Timothy 3.12). At the same time, some of our storms may be the result of our own bad choices, mistakes, and sins. In 2 Samuel 12:9-14, David was told that he would suffer greatly as a result of his committing adultery with Bathsheba and having her husband killed. David repented of his sin and was forgiven, but he still had to come through many storms as a consequence of his behaviour. Whatever their cause, we can allow our storms either to make us bitter or make us better.

Going back to the disciples in the boat, they awoke Jesus and said, "Don't you care that we perish?" (Mark 4:38) "And he got up, rebuked the wind, and said to the waves, 'Quiet! Be still!' Then the wind died down and it was completely calm." The apostles marvelled at this powerful display of Jesus' supernatural ability over the elements (Luke 8:25). This can be immensely comforting to the Christian in a storm. Faith in Christ is never misplaced. If He can calm the storms of the sea with one word, He can calm the storms of life as well.

He said to his disciples, Why are ye so afraid? Do you still have no faith? "They were terrified and asked each other, 'Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey him!" (Mark 4:36–41). As individuals, as families, as communities, as nations, even as a church, we have had sudden squalls arise which have made us ask one way or another, "Master, don't you care that we perish?" And one way or another we always hear in the stillness after the storm, "Why are ye so fearful? How is it that ye have no faith?" None of us would like to think we have no faith, but I suppose the Lord's gentle rebuke here is largely deserved. -->p7

Our great God, in whom we say we trust, the unknowable One who revealed Himself to us in Jesus Christ and whose name we have taken upon us, is he who spoke the world into being by his word. (Gen. 1:6.) Furthermore, it was he who parted the Red Sea, allowing the Israelites to pass through on dry ground. (See Ex. 14:21–22.) Certainly it should be no surprise that he could command a few elements acting up on the Sea of Galilee. And our faith should remind us that he can calm the troubled waters of our lives.

There is probably no one who has never had a fearful thought. But those thoughts should be quick, and should not stay in your mind for long. Satan loves to bring thoughts of doubt and fear. But faith in God will push out those thoughts. Then, instead of focusing how big your problem is, you will focus much bigger your God is! It is a fact of life (and science) that says two things cannot occupy the same space at the same time. Faith and fear cannot occupy the same space. In your heart and mind, there is either fear or faith. Our natural state is fear, because some situations are scary; we don't know the future; we know that bad things happen; some things are way too big (we think) for us to handle. But, when we receive God's gift of faith, it pushes out fear. (Romans 8:15).

Fear says, "This situation in my life (my health situation, children's future, finances etc ) is too much for me to handle." Faith says, "God is in control. He will handle this for me." Fear says, "I'm not sure if God is strong enough to handle this." Faith says, "Nothing is more powerful than God." Fear says, "I'm not sure if I can trust God." Faith says, "God only wants what's best for me."

Will you put your faith in Jesus during the perilous times that are coming on the church - a time when your job, your position, your liberty and even your very life would be on the line because you dare to stand alone like Daniel and his companions, to speak the truth about Jesus and uphold the standard of the Bible? It is already happening to our brethren in Syria, Libya, Pakistan, North Korea, Northern Nigeria, the Muslim dominated Arab world, and it is surreptitiously creeping in on us in the UK and Europe. The time has come when we need to put our trust in the Lord Jesus who stills the waters and He will bring to pass His will concerning us. Amen.

## THE DECLINE OF CHRISTIANITY

In five decades, I must start with a correction. Religion is in terminal decline all across Europe and particularly in Britain according to a new report. Ten years ago, only three per cent of British people described themselves as having no religion; now the proportion is 50 per cent and among the under -25s it is two thirds – a demographic that spells death for the church.

But here is my correction: religion is not in decline in Britain or in Europe generally, but Christianity is. Islam is thriving. The report's findings are an update on the figures recorded in 2011 census. They revealed that, owing to massive immigration over the last 10 years, there has been a 75 per cent increase in the Muslim population since the previous census. In those years alone, a further 600,000 Muslims immigrated to Britain. So that 10 per cent of the under-25 population in Britain is now Muslim. Moreover, almost half of British Muslims are

By contrast, nearly a quarter of British Christians are over 65, and their average age is nearly twice that of the Muslim population. At the most recent count, there were 1,743 mosques in Britain. In the next 10 years there will be many more. Meanwhile churches are closing al-

themselves below the age of 25.

most as fast as the pubs. So, as a nation, we are not becoming less religious, only less Christian.

Why is the Christian faith in catastrophic decline in Britain? It can't be because we don't have enough bishops: there are twice as many bishops in Britain today than there were in the 19<sup>th</sup> century when a quarter of the population regularly attended church. And if you don't like what you are this week, that's fine, for you can easily become something else next Monday morning.

The choices are limitless. Except not quite. The one thing that is taboo-you might say it is the new and the only mortal sin – is to object to this moral chaos. (Sorry, I mean of course this liberating new gospel of diversity).

If you claim that your traditional Christian morality and your conscience prevent your agreeing to accommodate homosexuals in your B&B, then I'm afraid you will lose your B&B. or if you oppose homosexual "marriage" you will incur the wrath of the commissars of the new social dictatorship. -->p10

All opinions are allowed – except that which clings to the Christian teachings of the last 2,000 years.

Everyone is permitted freedom of conscience – except Christians, who are not allowed to have a conscience. There has been a revo-

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lution and the secularising diversity-mongers have won it. It is a fait accompli, a done deal supported by all political parties and policed by the new secular authoritarians.

No use moaning about this. The old order –including Christianity – has been over thrown. The counter-culture is the culture now.

Here is one of Eliot's prophecies in The Idea of a Christian Society: "An individual European may not even believe that the Christian Faith is true, but what he says and makes and does will all spring out of this history of European culture and depend upon that culture for its meaning.

Only a Christian culture could have produced a Nietzsche or a Voltaire.

I do not believe that the culture of Europe could survive the complete disappearance of the Christian Faith. And I am convinced of that not merely because I am a Christian mybiology.

If Christianity goes, the whole of our culture goes. Then you must start painfully again, and you cannot put on a new culture ready-made. You must wait for the grass to grow to feed the sheep to give the wool out of which self, but as a student of social your new coat will be made...

# STORIES BEHIND GREAT HYMNS "PEACE BE STILL"

Let me recall for you the story of Mary Ann Baker. Sometime before 1874, Mary had lost both her parents to a respiratory disease. Her beloved and only brother suffered from the same disease that had taken their parents' lives, and he left their home in Chicago to find a warmer climate in the southern part of the United States. For a time he seemed to be improving, but then a sudden turn in his health came and he died almost immediately.

Mary Ann and her sister were heartbroken. It only added to their deep grief that neither their own health nor their personal finances allowed them to claim their brother's body or to finance its return to Chicago for burial. The Baker family had been raised as faithful Christians, but Mary's trust in a loving God broke under the strain of her brother's death and her own diminished circumstances. "God does not care for me or mine," said Mary Ann. "This particular manifestation of what they call 'divine providence' is unworthy of a God of love." Does that sound at all familiar?

"I have always tried to believe on Christ and give the Master a consecrated life," she said, "but this is more than I can bear. What have I done to deserve this? What have I left undone that God should wreak His vengeance upon me in this way?" (Ernest K. Emurian, *Living Stories of Famous Hymns*, Boston: W. A Widdle Co., 1955, pp. 83–85.)

However, after a while, her heart softened and her childhood faith returned to transform her from a rebellious woman to a more loving one. It was then that she wrote the following words, based on this story of Jesus but reflecting her own experience:

"Master, the tempest is raging!
The billows are tossing high!
The sky is o'ershadowed with blackness,
No shelter or help is nigh;
Carest Thou not that we perish?
How canst Thou lie asleep,
When each moment so madly is threatening
A grave in the angry deep?"

The answer that she learned and shared with others in this wonderful song is:

#### Refrain

"The winds and the waves shall obey Thy will,
Peace, be still!

Whether the wrath of the storm-tossed sea,
Or demons or men, or whatever it be,
No water can swallow the ship where lies
The Master of ocean, and earth, and skies;
They all shall sweetly obey Thy will,
Peace, peace be still."
