Vicar's three minute reflection JOY TO THE WORLD

Each year as we approach the Christmas season and the threshold of a new year, I have found it rewarding to reflect on the uniqueness of our Saviour, the Lord Jesus Christ. As one who believes in the authority and inspiration of the Scripture there is the hope and conviction that

the return of Christ is not only imminent, but that even those momentous events described in Matthew 24 cannot be far away. The world, for the most part, however, does not hold to such a belief. The world celebrates Christmas without Christ

and this grows more blatant as the years go by. And not only that, but many today resent the singing of carols or any sort of religious emphasis during the season of the year. Some have even suggested changing the

name of the season to some secular, nondescript name. In fact, do we not now live in a age in which only one prejudice is tolerated—anti-Christian bigotry?

Jesus Christ is the subject of more than 300 Old Testament prophecies. His birth nearly 2,000 years ago, and events of His life had been foretold by many prophets during a period of 1,500 years. History confirms that even the smallest detail happened just as predicted. It confirms beyond a doubt that Jesus is the true Messiah, the Son of God and Saviour of the world. Jesus has to be seen in the light of God's bigger story that goes back many centuries.

People who don't know Christ often wonder why we make so much fuss about Him. If only they could have a taste of the joy of abundant living which is not conditioned by the uncertainties of the money market, the reality of the economic crunch or the instability of our political world. If only they could know of the joy of sins forgiven and the assurance of being in a positive, intimate relationship with the One by whose hands the whole world is held together!

Other religions hold Jesus Christ in high honour, but they do not regard Him as the centre of God's purposes and the Emmanuel-God with us. Hindus recognize Him as an 'avatar' (incarnation) of Vishnu. Muslims acknowledge Him as one of the great prophets

whose virgin birth, sinless life, acts of kindness, miracles, and return one day to this earth are all affirmed in the Qur'an. Jews write of Him as a man of outstanding character. But Jesus Christ is not one Saviour among others; He is the only Saviour.

He is not one of Hinduism's 330 million gods or one of the 40 prophets recognized in the Qur'an. He is unique and the only Saviour of the world– God with us.' In an age when schools teach that all religions have equal value, we should never forget that Christianity is not one faith among many other faiths; it is in a category all by itself. Christianity is a relationship. Jesus is not a Saviour, He is the only Saviour' (Selwyn Hughes). On Him all the Old Testament truths converge and from Him all the New Testament truths emerge.

Christianity is a story mainly about Jesus— who He is, where He came from, what He has done, and what He is still doing. Let us keep Christ in all our Christmas celebrations. The number one way to keep Jesus Christ in your Christmas celebrations is to have him present in your daily life. If you're not sure what it means to become a believer in Christ, check out the article on "How to Become a Christian" (page 8). If you've already accepted Jesus as your Saviour and made him the centre of your life, keeping Christ in Christmas is more about the way you live and your willingness to talk about what Jesus is doing in your life.



LOVE: THE GREATEST FORCE ON EARTH-LOVING THE SAME AS CHRIST

The problem with love is that so many people don't have a clue what it is. Love is NOT a feeling; it's an ATTITUDE. Basing love on emotions, as the world does, has caused immeasurable pain to



countless numbers of people. It's like building a sand castle on the beach. It might look solid, but when the high tide rolls in, the sand castle isn't strong enough to hold up, and it washes away.

Feelings come and go.

We all experience a variety of emotions on any given day. Obviously, basing any human relationship strictly on feelings is asking for trouble. Parents who love their children only when the mood hits them are poor parents. A friend who remains loyal only until a better offer comes along

isn't much of a friend. A husband who deserts his wife and children because he finds another woman more attractive has missed the point of marriage.

The world gives love a staggering amount of attention. Movies, songs, and books about love generate billions of dollars in revenue. The problem is that love is presented as something to be "fallen into" and "fallen out of." There's no solution given for what to do when the emotion fails you and the warm fuzzies are gone—other than bailing out and starting over with someone else. You can recognize worldly love by how unpredictable it is.

The Bible offers a different kind of love.

This love says I'm committed to act lovingly toward this person regardless of how I feel. You'll be able to recognize biblical love: It's patient, unselfish, and loyal. It doesn't keep score; it assumes the best motives. It gives without seeking in return; it always seeks to honour God, and it endures through thick, and thin, and in-between. Feelings change. Feelings don't last, but Biblical Love is eternal.

Love: The Greatest Force on earth Loving the same as Christ

Loving the same

There's a difference between God's love and the love that the world knows. If we aren't careful, Christians can begin to adopt the world's way of loving instead of God's. The world says *love is a feeling*. When you stop *feeling* love for someone, it means you no longer love him or her. The world encourages you to love the lovable but gives you permission to hate your enemies. Jesus said loving those who love you is no great feat; it's loving your enemies that proves you are a loving person (Matthew 5:46).

Jesus commanded those who wanted to be his disciples to follow HIS standard for loving people rather than the world's standard. Jesus directs us to love others in exactly the same way he loves us. When Jesus saw us hopelessly enslaved to

sin, he didn't say, "I don't feel like dying on a cross for them. I think I'll wait until the feeling comes." He didn't say, "I've tried and tried to love them but they always reject me. I give up!"

Jesus said loving those who love you is no great feat; it's loving your enemies that prove you are a loving person.

Jesus saw that without him we would perish, and He acted lovingly

toward us despite our rejecting Him. His love didn't depend on what we did to deserve it, or even on whether we accepted it. Jesus freely and unconditionally gave us his love.



This is how God wants us to love our spouses. Not with strings attached, as the world loves. Not just love as long as they're lovable. Not just love as long as they appreciate it. God wants us to give our love freely and unconditionally. Only God can help us to love people in this way.

YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Down a long, nearly deserted California beach an old man is walking. Every few steps he bends down, picks up something, and throws it in the water. A young jogger has been running along, and as he was running he watched the old man. Finally his curiosity gets him and he runs over to the old man, and asks what he's doing.

The man said, "I'm saving the life of these starfish. The storm washed them up last night, and the sun will be up and hot in about 30 minutes. It'll kill them, so I'm throwing them back into the water to save their lives."

HOW TO BECOME A CHRISTIAN

Salvation Begins With God: Have you felt the "tug" of God on your heart? Becoming a Christian is one of the most important steps you will take in your life on earth. Continue reading to learn what the Bible teaches about becoming a Christian and what it means to be a follower of Christ.

This call to salvation begins with God. He initiates it by wooing or drawing us to come to Him. John 6:44 "No one can come to me unless the Father who sent me draws him ..." (NIV)

Human Efforts are Futile: God desires an intimate relationship with us, but we cannot obtain it through our own efforts. Isaiah 64:6 "All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags..." Romans 3:10-12"...There is no one righteous, not even one; there is no one who understands, no one who seeks God. All have turned away, they have together become worthless; there is no one who does good, not even one."

Separated by Sin: We have a problem. Our sin separates us from God, leaving us spiritually empty. Romans 3:23 "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." It is impossible for us to find peace with God through our own efforts. Anything we try to do to obtain God's favour or gain salvation is worthless and futile.

A Gift from God: Salvation then, is a gift from God. He offers the gift through Jesus, his Son. By laying down his life on the cross, Christ took our place and paid the ultimate price, the penalty for our sin -- death. Jesus is our only way to God. John 14:6 Jesus said "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me." (NLT) Romans 5:8 "But God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us."

Responding to God's Call: The only thing we must do is respond to God's call.

But how? How do I become a Christian? Receiving God's gift of salvation is not complicated.

How to become a Christian

The response to God's call is explained in these simple steps found in God's Word:

- 1) **Admit** you are a sinner and turn away from your sin. Acts 3:19 says: "Repent, then, and turn to God, so that your sins may be wiped out, that times of refreshing may come from the Lord." Repent literally means "a change of attitude that results in a change of direction— a yielding of our wills to God in order to have His way" The resulting "change in action" is, of course, the turning away from sin.
- 2) **Believe** Jesus Christ died on the cross to save you from your sins and give you eternal life. John 3:16 says: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him will not perish but have eternal life." (NLT) Believing in Jesus is also a part of repenting. God the Father planned it. In full co-operation, God the Son effected it, and God the Holy Spirit makes the death of Christ personal to us as we respond to His promptings.
- 3) **Come** to him by faith. It is not enough just to know the fact that the Lord Jesus died to save us from our sins. We must yield the control of our life to Him. Doing your best, trusting in luck or any other being will not bring you to God. Christ's claim is an exclusive one. Jesus said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one can come to the Father except through me." (NLT) How then can we come to Him?

4) **Pray**.

You may want to make your response to God a prayer. Prayer is simply communicating with God. Pray using your own words. There is no special formula. Just pray from your heart to God, and believe *that he has* saved you. If you feel lost and just don't know what to pray, here's a suggestion.

Dear Lord,


I admit that I am a sinner. I have done many things that don't please you. I have lived my life for myself.

WHY IS "SILENT NIGHT" SO POPILAR?

Why has "Silent Night" become our most beloved carol? Is it the words -- tender, intimate, gentle? Or the tune -- so peaceful, so memorable, so easy to play or pick out with one hand on the piano?

It is not a joyous, fast-paced carol like Handel's "Joy to the World." Nor theologically-rich like Charles Wesley's "Hark, the Herald Angels Sing." Nor does it have a complex tune like "Angels We Have Heard on High." Rather, "Silent Night" is quiet and reflective, calling us to meditate on the scene. It is the ambience conveyed by both the gentle words and melody that create from this carol an oasis of peace.

"All is calm, all is bright."

It calls us to dwell on Mary and the Child

"Round yon Virgin, mother and Child, Holy Infant, so tender and mild, Sleep in heavenly peace."

You feel as the "shepherds quake at the sight." You can imagine as "heavenly hosts sing Alleluia." And you begin to sing "Alleluia to the King" right along with them.

Rays of backlit brilliance highlight many a religious painting, but here the picture of light is painted in words:

"Glories stream from heaven afar...."

"Son of God, love's pure light"

"Radiant beams from Thy holy face...."


"Christ, the Saviour is born!"
