

Vicar's three minute reflection YOUR ROOTS FOR DAILY LIFE



Ever since Alex Haley's novel, Roots, hit the bookstands in the mid-70s, there has been an increasing number of people interested in their heritage. Many people buy computers and get on the internet primarily to keep track of their family tree.

Finding our roots, unveiling the people of our past, is a process that helps us discover who we are by looking at where we came from. But it's only the beginning. Even more telling is the guestion of where we have set our roots for daily LIFE. What motivates our day-to-day existence? Or I could put the question to

you in this way, "What's the biggest thing in your LIFE?" What's most important to you?

Some might answer, "My home and family, everything revolves around them." Or someone else,

"What's the biggest thing in your LIFE?" What's most important to you?

"My country, first, last and always." Some might even say, "My work, my work means everything to me; without that, I'd be lost." Others might answer, "My youth. The important thing in my LIFE right now is the fact that I'm young." Many would simply reply, "Health and happiness." Don't we say, "If you've got your health, you've got just about everything?" And we all want to be happy.

These are certainly important facts of LIFE, the foliage which enhances our daily living. Then we must ask, "What if these things go?" What happens when your home or your family is crushed by news of a fatal illness or shattered by the death of a loved one? What if you lose your job? Or if your income no longer pays the bills? What if you wake up one day and realize that you're not just getting older but that you're getting old!" For our youth goes, too. The springtime of LIFE so guickly turns to autumn, and then to winter.

In a society that idolizes youth, it's tough to accept the fact that our youth is literally passing away. As for health and happiness, there may be some reading this piece whose health is

gone; some of you are looking for healing, or bearing a burden too heavy to bear, so you are looking for a word of encouragement. For others, an increasing number of problems have cast a pall over your LIFE, and you wish that someone would listen to you and try to understand. You are not very happy and you're not so sure you ever will be again. LIFE is so uncertain.


In his book, Man's Search for Meaning, Dr. Victor Frankly, a Jewish psychiatrist, tells how he survived three unimaginably grim years in Nazi concentration camps. His wife, his brother, his mother and father, all were killed in similar camps. He, himself, was stripped of all his possessions—his clothing, watch, rings, even his glasses. Then they shaved all the hair off his body and he was utterly naked. Now, you see, the question he had to face was, "Does my LIFE have any meaning now?" Family gone; all possessions gone; position in the community, gone; all dignity, gone; possessing only what he called, "My ridiculously naked LIFE." He asked: Now does my being have roots? Is there any reason to continue living?

Yes. There is. If Jesus is your Redeemer, even when you lose all material things, you have everything because you have Him. Death does not touch Him. Demons have no power on Him. Principalities are powerless around Him. The future is not in contest because He has the future in His hands. And if you are within the warm embrace of His love, you will have His peace which enables you to smile at the storms. Paul was so excited about this fact that he burst out in Romans 8:31-39 saying "Who will separate us from..." Dele Agbelusi

THE BEST PRESENT TO GIVE YOUR SPOUSE

A man in Dallas says his grandfather used to whisper this into the ears of brides and grooms: "Marriage is like a hot bath. Once you get in it, and used to it, it's not so hot anymore." Indeed,



one thing you can count on in marriage, is that between kids and careers and the junk that clutters the days, it's hard to sustain hotness and bliss.

After speaking to many men and women in various stages of relationships, from newlywed to affairs to golden anniversaries, I can tell you that partners who are hugged and kissed and hear "I love you" behave better. There's real power in a soft and unexpected brush of the lips on the forehead of your husband at the dinner table. What wife doesn't want to be told she looks beautiful?

Many people shared in interviews, with wrenching remorse that they could have saved their marriages by simply paying more attention to the person who slept next to them, night after night. We shop for roses and clothes, jewellery and hearts for husbands and wives on Valentine's Day. Yet the euphoria of opening a small box and unveiling something spangly and expensive is fleeting. Consistently loving behaviour, exhibited when you wake up day after day, is the real prescription for the ongoing health of a marriage, more than any diamond or Italian suit.

We love our children wholly and unconditionally, showering them with emotional and physical affection. Overscheduled and overwhelmed, too often we forget to love— even forget to talk to— the most important person in our life, the man or woman who gave us those kids, the foundation of family and dreams for the future. Marriage needs to be fussed over or else it will break. Intimacy takes work. One woman said that her husband was never the kind of guy who sent surprise bouquets. But he was someone who said, "I love you" every day. There are some couples who don't even know what the other person has done in the past week.

They literally say good morning and good night and that's it. This is a disaster waiting to happen to the relationship. It helps to ask your spouses about their day at work or school or the house. Court them, compliment them, and seduce them. No touching is bad news.

If the sexual life is freezing up, draw up a time table— times when you can be on your own uninterrupted.

And how do the children feature in this conundrum? Do parenting together. It adds to the fun of marital bonding. In an ideal world, people would agree on and develop a parenting philosophy and style long before they had children. In reality, however, most of us don't know what we're in for, and tend to react to situations as they occur. Be proactive, Even if you lead parallel lives, you can maintain the same vision and be part of the same team." Ensure that you schedule time for family fun and meetings—devoting time to your family might mean postponing some personal gratification. It might mean saying no a lot more often than you'd like. It might even mean turning down volunteer opportunities, until the kids are old enough to participate.

And keep in mind that it's the "You're-an-adult, get-up-and-go-get-it-yourself" syndrome that kills good feelings between marital partners. Remember that there are many people out there, in addition to you, who have responsibility to love and nurture children (parents, teachers, friends, music teachers, coaches...). But oftentimes, your partner has no one but you to nurture their simple acts of kindness! And, if you are too preoccupied with "taking care of children" or the "family finances" that you have very little time for each other, it won't be too long before there is an affair - or, at the least, extreme loneliness.

Finally, do not keep Jesus, your greatest Lover out of your marital bliss or woes. Talk to Him and listen to Him. He is one Friend you can always count on. He gives life to the fullest even in a marital situation. Why? He invented it.

A DIET FOR LOSERS

That kind of Christianity, of course, is just as ridiculous as the "diet for losers."

IT'S THE ROOT THAT COUNTS

One day a little boy named Julian fell down while chasing butterflies in a field of tall grass. Soon afterward, the boy's left eye started hurting, so he was taken to a doctor. The doctor couldn't find the source of the irritation, so he just gave the boy some ointment and sent him home.

Eventually Julian's eye problem went away. About a year later, though, the boy started complaining of cloudy vision. His parents took him to an eye specialist, who was stunned by what he discovered.

Apparently when Julian had fallen a year earlier, a tiny grass seed had implanted itself in his cornea. Slowly the seed had grown and had actually sprouted two little leaves in Julian's eye. The seed had to be removed immediately in order to save the boy's vision.

Sometimes when we fall into sin, we tell ourselves things like, "That didn't hurt."

But sin has a way of implanting itself into our hearts and growing into something that can do permanent damage to our souls. Sin can blur our vision and cause us to take our eyes off Christ. Satan wouldn't have it any other way.

Have you allowed sin to take root in your life? Is your vision blurred? Unless the root of sin is surgically removed, it will destroy you and your relationship with God. The removal can't be done with ointment. Only Jesus can get rid of your sin. That's why he went to the cross.

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9).

PARENTING CAN BE FUN

Once we asked the kids to compile a list of the things we most often said to them. This is what they wrote:

- I'm not talking just to hear my jaws flap.
- You just ate.
- It'll be good for you.
- Sit back and buckle up.
- Not another word.
 I had to walk five miles to school and five miles home and it was uphill both ways.
- Don't touch each other.
- There are starving people in Africa.
 Don't you look at me like that.
 I'll give you something to cry about.
- Ask your mother.
 Ask your father.
- That drives me nuts.

 If you pick at it--it won't heal.

Then there are the mixed messages like:

- Shut your mouth and eat.
- Hurry up and don't run.
- Don't be smart.

Has formulating this list caused us to stop saying these things? Of course not. But at least laughing together about them makes it slightly less nausea-provoking to the kids when they're repeated for the eight-zillionth time.

There's no place in parenting for "jokes" that ridicule or put down children. But all kinds of room exists for humour that replaces sarcasm, or diffuses genuine fury. There are days with Heidi and Nathan, when, listening to songs about how sweet children are (even ours!), I wish the tape would self-destruct. On one really rough day I told the kids, "Here's a parenting song I'd like to write: 'I've got bald spots on my head, from tearin' my hair out over yew-w-w-w.' "

Humour is the spoonful of sugar that makes the medicine of all our serious parenting efforts more palatable to children.

Daniel Webster was a great orator with a quick mind. In his early years, Webster's father left specific instructions for Daniel and his brother Ezekiel. When the elder Webster returned from a trip, the job was still unfinished. He questioned his boys about their slothfulness. "What have you been doing, Ezekiel?" "Nothing, sir," was his son's reply. The father turned to his other boy and asked, "Well, Daniel, what have you been doing?" Webster answered, "Helping Zeke, sir."

10 -MINUTE BIBLE STUDY ON JAMES 2

James clearly shows that true faith will be seen in action; in our acts of mercy to the helpless, in the use of our tongues, and in our willingness not to be tainted by the world, which comes in chapters 4-5. in 2:14-26, James issues us with a direct challenge. He asks you and me: Is your faith dead or alive? Are you authentic or a phoney?

James is in no way contradicting the apostle Paul here. Paul was writing to people who were thinking they could work their way to heaven. So Paul says: 'The only way you can be saved is by trusting what Jesus has done for you. You cannot get to heaven by the good things you do.' James writes for people who say: 'Yes, I have faith, I trust in what Jesus has done. I can just put my feet up and enjoy the journey.' To them James says: 'If you really believe, then your belief will be seen in the way you act. You cannot be saved by simply saying you believe.' That's the emphases of the two writers. There is no contradiction between James and Paul.

So, what is dead faith? It is all mouth but no action. Verse 14: If you truly follow Jesus as Lord and Saviour then you will live his way. To make his point James gives an example of dead faith, the sort of belief which does not act and shows itself to be false. Verse 15: 'Suppose a brother or sister is without clothes... Now James here is talking about the armchair Christian. Think of the armchair cricketer who knows all the rules, and criticizes the umpire when he's made a bad decision, or berates the batsman for getting caught out, and yet put this armchair fan on a cricket pitch and they'd be hopeless. They sound very impressive, and yet they are all mouth and no action. And James says in the world of faith, it is very dangerous to be an armchair Christian. James' illustration is very biting. Because he's not talking about people who live on the streets who we see in the centre of London. He's talking about people in the church who are in great trouble- these people are spiritual brothers or sisters. This armchair Christian simply sees this person in trouble and says: 'Oh well. Don't worry. I'll pray for you.' And then he sends them on their way, (contd on page 13)

with not a hint of willingness of getting involved. They don't want to be troubled. That's dead faith.

2) Living Faith is about Costly Sacrifice (Vv 20-24)

Verse 20: 'You foolish man! Do you want evidence that faith without deeds is useless?' And for an example he gives us Abraham. Abraham showed his trust in God by living God's way and obeying him. In Genesis 22, the sacrifice of Isaac his only son, or the near sacrifice, as God stopped Abraham just as the knife was falling, is the highpoint of Abraham's walk of faith. He trusted in God and was willing to sacrifice Isaac, because he knew, as Hebrews tells us, that God could raise Isaac from the dead. It was faith in action.

3) Living Faith is about Courageous Service (Vv 25-26) But then finally, James tells us another mark of living faith in verses 25-26 and that is courageous service. Verse 25: 'In the same way, was not the prostitute Rahab considered righteous for what she did... Now of course we might be tempted to think, why on earth has James chosen Rahab as an example of faith. After all, you cannot get a lower example- she was a prostitute and she was a pagan, not a Jew. If she can have faith in God which is seen in action, then anybody can (You'll find the whole story in Joshua 2.) And so James concludes this passage in verse 26: 'As the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without deeds is dead.' Rahab showed her faith by courageous service. Is that what marks you as a Christian? Someone whose Christian life is one of courageous service, who is willing to put reputation, money and even life on the line for the sake of the faith you believe in? It may sound a tall order, but as Rahab discovered there is only one God worth serving. Let Rahab be an example to us today- the pagan prostitute who put her money where her mouth was, spiritually speaking. That is the mark of living faith- courageous service.

Above all let's remember today that we should not simply hear the word, and so deceive ourselves, we should do what it says.
