Vicar's three minute reflection

GIVE THANKS WITH A GRATEFUL HEART



There is an old story told about a farmer who received a visit from his pastor. The farmer had purchased the farm just three years earlier. Together they walked around and admired the healthy corn, rising as high as a basketball goal. The soybean crop was coming on strongly. The pastureland was knee-deep in good grazing for the cows. The pastor said, "My friend, God has certainly blessed you richly." The farmer nodded and replied, "Maybe so, but you should have seen this place when God had it all by himself." One hopes that the pastor then suggested that they sit in the shade and talk. Then the pastor might have asked, "Who gave you the health to work this farm? Who supplied the rain for these crops? Who causes a seed to germinate in the first place? Who provides even your next breath of air?" It is so easy for us to take God and His provision for granted. Some of us will not even remember to thank Him for all that He has done, but rather, nag Him about those not yet provided.

If you have food in the refrigerator, clothes on your body, a roof over your head and a place to sleep, you are richer than 75% of people in this world. If you have money in the bank, cash in your wallet and spare change in a dish someplace, you are among the top 8% of the earth's wealthiest people. If you woke up this morning with more health than illness, you are more fortunate than the million who will not survive this week. If you have never experienced the danger of battle, the loneliness of imprisonment, the agony of torture or the pangs of starvation, you are ahead of 500 million people in the world. If you can attend the thanksgiving worship service on September 24 or any other religion-related meeting, without fear of harassment, arrest, torture or death, you are fortunate - billions of people in the world cannot.



It is not hard for us to count our blessings, is it? Most of us could easily jot down a rather lengthy list. Paul brought this message home to the Corinthians by asking a penetrating question: "What do you have that you did not receive?" That is, when you consider your really significant assets, what do you have that was not a gift? The scientist Thomas LaMance noted that "Despite all of man's accomplishments, he owes his existence to a six-inch layer of topsoil and the fact that it rains." And, of course, God is the giver of the topsoil and the rain.

In the Bible the words for gratitude and faith are interchangeable. If one is thankful he must also be a person of faith. Show me a person who is not thankful, whose attitude is that life has somehow short-changed him, and I will show you one person who does not have a complete faith in God. One day you and I are going to travel that last long journey. In the meantime we have life in this world. Life with its challenges and its blessings, joys and ecstasies. Life with its occasional pain, but also life with excitement and victory and surprises and times of incomparable inspiration. How can any one of us be ungrateful, regardless of our circumstances? How can anyone of us fail to thank God for all that he has done for us. It's the kind of gratitude that allowed the apostle Paul to write from a prison cell: I give thanks to God through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. This does not mean that we are to put on a false front of happiness. It does not mean that we are to try to psyche ourselves into feeling better. Rather we are thankful in times of hardship because we know that, just as it was on Calvary's hill, it is God who has the final word. We know that in all circumstances victory is ours through faith in Christ Jesus

HOW GOOD ARE YOU, HUSSY?



In Ephesians 5:25 the Bible says: "Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her. The same Scripture passage says a couple of verses earlier, "The husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church" (v. 23). Sadly, however, too many of us deviate from the Writer's script, and in its place allow contemporary ideas of what husbands and wives are to be to dictate our understanding of marriage. The result? Far too many marriages get off track. But God's Word tells us, "Don't become so well adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out" (Romans 12:2, *The Message*).

Now, let's take a look at what the script says about what God calls husbands to do and be:

He is called to lead: It doesn't mean control, passive non-involvement, asserted superiority, or taking advantage. On the contrary, a husband must never use his role as leader for selfish benefit. A husband must never put his wife into a strait-jacket of compliance, or she will wither and her love for him will deaden. Even recent secular research has shown that what kills the love of a spouse for the other is attempting to control our partner rather than serve them.

The authority God gives men to lead is built on service. Some men behave like drill sergeants, snapping out orders at their wives and children, which doesn't reflect Scripture but their own selfishness and insecurity. The truth is, a husband is called to think of others—particularly his wife—first, ahead of himself. That's not easy for many men. For one thing, the idea of being a servant leader runs counter to the thinking in our present-day "me" culture. But with some hard work and sacrifice, it can be done.

He is called to Sacrificial Love: God's script also calls the husband to be not just a servant leader but also a lover, meaning that his headship of his family is not to exhibit dominating control but the sacrificial love of Jesus.

How good are you, hussy?

A husband represents Jesus in the home, and his role is to bring out God's glory in his wife and lift her up—for her well-being. This is leadership that leaves a wife feeling special, valued, and loved. So how specifically can a husband do that? There are many ways, one of the most important being a husband's putting his wife first over children, parents, siblings, work, TV, and hobbies. He is to respond, react, speak, and think toward her in ways that enable her to develop who she is and to develop her gifts as a way to bring glory to God. Doing this will strengthen a marriage. But conversely, not doing it will weaken the marriage.

The husband is called to Lead—and Love—Sacrificially: A Sacrificial love involves participating in something that is important or a favourite of hers, even if it's relatively unimportant to you or definitely not one of your favourites. It may mean doing any of the following (although it's not limited to any or all of them):

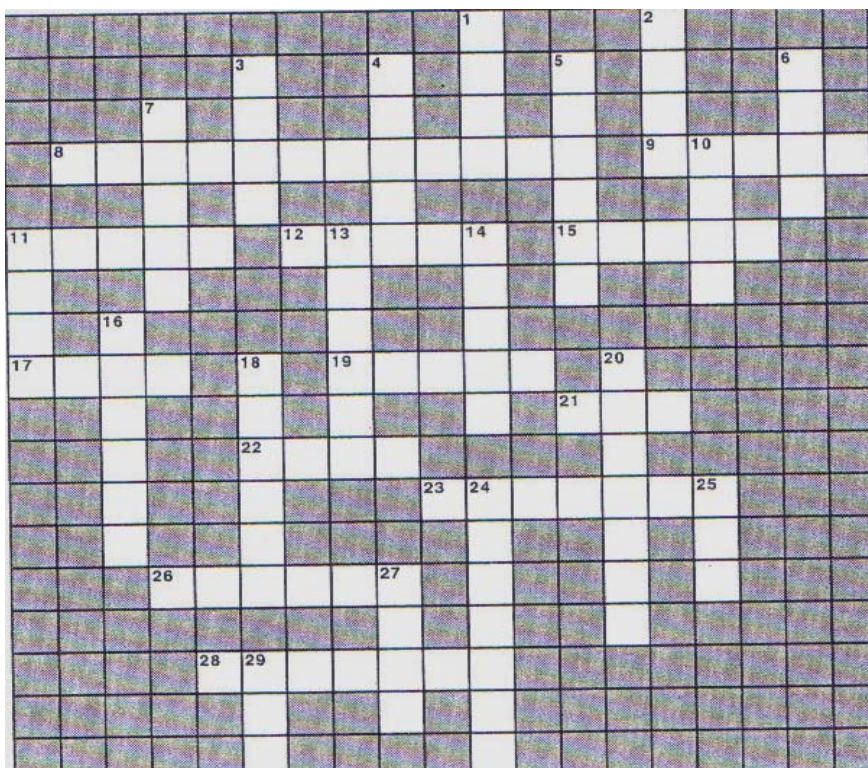
- Learning to say these three phrases: "You were right," "I was wrong," and "I am sorry."
- Calling her with any delay of plans.
- Practicing Proverbs 31:28-29 (praising her) consistently.
- Accepting her communication style and opinions as different from yours, and not necessarily wrong.
- Asking for her opinion. Before we move on, ask yourself which of these you did this past month. Then ask yourself which of these you will do during the coming month.

Called to Lead by Learning

One study showed that men who enjoyed the most stable, happy marriages were also likely to be those who listened to their wives' suggestions and concerns and followed them. These were men who were willing to learn, change, and grow. I have found that to be true in my own marriage. Over the years, I have learned that my wife is innately gifted with knowledge, insights, and abilities I don't have. That is probably why the apostle Peter wrote, "[Husbands,] live with your wives in an understanding way... and show them respect" (1 Peter 3:7, NCV),

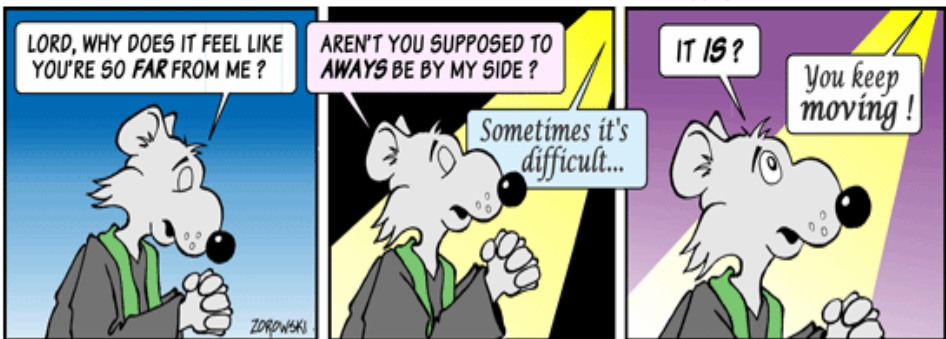

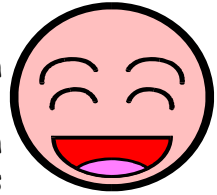
## A Catholic Heart Attack

## HOW TO ACT YOUR WAGE

### **Living by biblical principles will bring you financial peace.**

A few years ago James Peterson and Peter Kim co-authored a book entitled *The Day America Told The Truth*. The book was the result of surveys that were given to one thousand people who were asked to answer a number of moral and ethical questions in complete honesty—with a guarantee of absolute anonymity.

One question was "What would you be willing to do for 10 million dollars?" Here is how they responded...

- 25% would abandon their family (spouse, children, or parents) for 10 million dollars.
- 23% said they would become a prostitute for a week for 10 million dollars.
- 7% said they would be willing to kill a stranger for 10 million dollars.

This is an example of the kind of hold that money has on people. It is amazing the kinds of things people will do for money.

The Bible tells us we are not to love money, but the fact is we need money to function in the world. There are utility bills, phone bills, car payments, mortgage payments, life insurance, health insurance, car insurance, food, holidays, clothes—all of which require money.

The Bible has a lot to say about money. Jesus spoke often on this topic—in fact he said more about it than other topic he discussed. He mentioned money more than 300 times; more than half the parables he told had to do with money or money management.

Now most people assume their money problems stem from not earning enough. The truth is, most of us earn a good enough living to meet our needs and afford many of the things we want.

## How to act your wage (continued)

The problem for most people is not how much they earn but how they manage what they earn.

So today we will talk about money management. We will examine five foundations for financial freedom given by Solomon—whom the Bible calls the wisest and wealthiest man who ever lived. The financial principles he teaches us in the book of Proverbs work as well today as they did then:

### **Principle 1. Live by a budget**

The plans of the diligent lead to profit, as surely as haste leads to poverty. (Proverbs 21:5) For some people the word "budget" is intimidating. It doesn't have to be that way. A budget is simply a plan. All you have to do is put down on paper what your income is and what your living expenses are. You designate a certain amount of money for food, rent, phone, insurance, automobile, and the rest.

If you're not sure what some of these expenses are, it is helpful to track your spending for the first month or so to see exactly where your money is going. This can be quite enlightening.

### **Principle 2. Save for the future.**

He who gathers money little by little makes it grow. (Proverbs 13:11) and the wise man saves for the future, but the foolish man spends everything. (Proverbs 21:20)

### **Principle 3. Put God first in you finances**

Someone once asked John D. Rockefeller his secret of success. He said, "Save 10%, tithe 10%, and live on the rest."

This is a good financial habit to get into. Throughout the book of Proverbs Solomon points out the benefits and rewards of putting the Lord first in our finances.

## How to act your wage (continued)

Honour the Lord with your wealth, with the first fruits of all your crops, then your barns will be filled to overflowing. (Proverbs 3:9-10) A generous man will himself be blessed. (Proverbs 22:9) He who is kind to the poor lends to the Lord, and will be rewarded for what he has done. (Proverbs 19:17)

Have you ever noticed that stingy people never seem to have enough? They tend to be unhappy and self-absorbed. On the other hand, generous people never seem to go without. They are characterized by a joyful, loving spirit. God's word says that is exactly how it works.

### The reasons we should tithe are:

#### a. Out of gratitude for the past.

This is an attitude that says, "God, I realize that you have made it possible for me to earn a paycheck. You have given me this job and the skills to do it. To show my appreciation for all that you have done for me, I want to give ten percent back to you." Remember that giving to the Lord is not like playing the Lottery. God does not owe us anything but we owe everything that we have and are to Him.

#### b. To keep our priorities straight today.

The purpose of tithing is to teach you to put God first in every area of your life. (Deuteronomy 14:23)

I met a pastor last year who told me that the top giver in his church was a wealthy lady. She wasn't employed; she lived off her investments. Every year in December she wrote a single check to church for about \$20,000. After doing this for years, she suddenly changed her strategy—she began writing checks to the church every week for \$400.

It didn't matter to the pastor whether she gave once a week, once a month or once a year, but he was curious why she changed her giving pattern.



## How to act your wage (continued)

When he asked her about it she said, "Writing a big check once a year was like a business transaction between me and God. I felt like I was paying a bill. Now, when I write a check every week, I am reminding myself that God is first in my life, day in and day out."

### Principle 4. Avoid Debt

Imagine you receive a letter that says,

*"Congratulations, you have been selected to become a slave. Just fill out the enclosed card and return it in the pre-paid envelope and your slavery will begin on the 15th of next month."*

That's what's written in invisible ink in all of those credit card offers that come in the mail. Solomon said...

"The rich rule over the poor and the borrower is a slave to the lender." (Proverbs 22:7)

It's not a sin to have a credit card, but you have to use it wisely.

### Principle 5. Don't expect money to make you happy.

Solomon discovered this for himself. He said: "I built homes for myself, with gardens and trees. I had servants to wait on me hand and foot. I had herds and flocks. I amassed silver and gold. I denied myself nothing my eyes desired. Yet when I surveyed all I had worked to achieve, I was still empty and unsatisfied." (Ecclesiastes 2:4-11).

One thing about human nature—no matter how much you make, your yearnings will always exceed your earnings.

## How to act your wage (conclusion)

There's an old cliché about the guy who loses his health trying to accumulate wealth, then loses his wealth trying to get back his health. Though we need money to survive in this world, if we look to money for happiness it will leave us feeling empty and unsatisfied. This is why Solomon said:

Do not wear yourself out to get rich, have wisdom to show restraint. (Proverbs 23:4) Instead of looking to wealth for fulfillment in life, we should look to God. Solomon said: Looking to God and living for God, that's where you'll find what you really want and need in life. (Ecclesiastes 12:13)

### CONCLUSION

Solomon's five foundations for effective money management are...

1. Live on a budget.
2. Save for the future.
3. Put God first in your finances.
4. Avoid debt.
5. Don't expect money to make you happy.

This comes down to a matter of controlling the money we have, instead of being controlled by the money we don't have. Whether you have a little or a lot, you can live by these principles. If you do, you will experience something few people ever do: you will find financial peace. D.A.

## PRAYER IS FOR PAUPERS?

There are different reasons why people do not pray to the Living God. We will examine only three of the reasons in this month's devotional. The first reason is that people have a wrong view about prayer. When we define prayer narrowly as "asking God for things", then naturally we come to God in prayer only when we have a need that we are not able to meet with the resources and connections at our disposal.

A pastor once remarked that members of his church were not interested in a Prayer Seminar because they did not have any need. Materially, they had all that a person needed. Thus to them prayer is for paupers and not for the affluent. This is arrogance! Human needs go far beyond what money can buy, so we will always be needy people.

Prayer is not basically for the individuals' need; rather, it involves intercession - bringing the needs of other people to God. The prayer life of Jesus Christ and Apostle Paul confirm that. Prayer also involves praise, worship, adoration and confession - a basic need of every human being as the means for connecting with the Living God who created us for Himself to have fellowship with Him all the time.
