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Vicar's three minute reflection Be the One in Ten who is Always Grateful!

Twenty centuries ago, Jesus, the Son of God, was walking through the human experience. One day, close to Jerusalem, he came across ten lepers. The nationality of the entire group is unclear, but we know one of them was a despised Samaritan.

Leprosy was a scourge of humanity in those days. Men and women who had the disease were subjected not only to the reality of great suffering, slowly leading to death, but also to the tragedy of exile from their communities and separation from those whom they loved. Ancient Egyptians called leprosy "death before death".

Recognizing Jesus, they did not cry "unclean, unclean" as tradition required them when they were coming close to people. Instead they called out and said, "Jesus, Master, have pity on us!" Jesus had compassion on them and simply said, "Go show yourself to the priests." Miraculously, on their way, they were totally healed. But sadly, only the Samaritan returned: "He threw himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him" (Luke 17:16 NIV). He was one out of ten lepers that were healed.

What strikes us as supremely ironic is that as soon as nine of these men were healed, they became like everybody else. They once spoke with one voice now they have scattered. They once called Jesus "Master", now they forget him. They once cried for help, but when they got it only one of them gave thanks. Perhaps the other nine would be thanking their luck as many of us do.

Is there someone in the course of your life you have forgotten to thank? In the United States of America, there is a bank holiday for Thanksgiving. I wonder how many people actually utilise this opportunity to say "thank you" to others. I won't be surprised if the delights of most hearts will be the holiday from work so they can labour at the variety of digestible delights. Yet, folks are still waiting to be thanked.

Take this week and survey your life. Ask God to bring instances to your mind when you completely forgot to thank some benefactor. Maybe it was a small favour. Perhaps you were just one of a group to which the gift was given. Make an effort to thank at least one person you failed to thank earlier. That one will be surprised, delighted--and thankful.

Why don't you be the "one" in ten who is always grateful.



One year when Christmas Day came on a Sunday, a farmer decided to go to church. (Like some people, he thought he was fulfilling his religious obligation by going to church twice a year--at Christmas and Easter!).

The sermon that day was preached from the text, "The ox knows his owner, and the donkey his master's manger: but Israel does not know, my people do not understand" (Isaiah 1:3). Isaiah is saying that man is more dumb than the animals.

After church the farmer returned home and stood among his cows. One of them began to lick his hand--a practical demonstration of the sermon he had just heard. Strong man though he was, the farmer began to weep as he thought, "God did much more for me, and yet I never thanked Him. My cow is far more grateful than I am. What do I ever give her other than grass and water?"

Will you give thanks to God for His goodness towards you, even when you are going through difficult times? When you drop your offerings in the bowl at church, does your gift reflect an act of gratitude to God for His many blessings? Or are you so blessed that small gifts are inconsequential to you? When you wake up in the morning, do not forget to give thanks to the Lord for the gift of another day. Oh that men and women will praise the Lord for His goodness and for His wonderful works.

RANDOM WORDS OF THANKS

When was the last time you said, "Thanks" to your spouse? Oh, we don't mean saying "Thanks" for passing the salt or even "Thanks" when they get something for you that you could-



n't get on your own. Most people do that. We mean saying "Thanks" for some of the little niceties that your spouse does that you may overlook in expressing thanks. And yet those "niceties" probably make your day a little brighter when they do them! So why not thank them?

Even in the most difficult of situations there is some overlooked blessing that we may not be focusing on because of the bigger situation that's receiving our attention. The Bible says in 1 Thessalonians 5:18 says to, "give thanks in all circumstances for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." This means that there is always something, either apparent or hidden, for which we can be thankful. We may not understand why God has allowed certain things to happen to us but we need to trust His heart and His ultimate plans for the world (including us) that He will work some kind of good out of it. For that we can find reasons to be thankful!

You may have heard the term performing "Random Acts of Kindness" — which is finding ways to bless others by intentionally doing something kind for them. It's random because it's done spontaneously (and is usually unexpected). It may be taking them out to lunch, or washing their car (without being asked), or tucking a little gift of money in a place where they will eventually find it with a note that says "This is a little something for you to use. Enjoy!" Those are just a few examples of doing random acts of kindness for others. But what about expressing to our spouse "Random Words of Thanks"?

Some examples of "Random Words of Thanks" would be to:

• Thank them for getting up each morning to go to work. There are many spouses who decide to be lazy and not provide financially for their family so they don't roll out of bed to go to work. If you have a spouse who does go to work-look for different times and different ways to express your thanks.

This may surprise them, but tell them you appreciate their commitment in doing this. It's nice to know someone notices things like that sometimes.

- Thank them for planning the meals, and shopping for the food, and all the work they put in for preparing what you eat each day. Even if you helped in doing part of this, the initiative they showed in making sure everything was done should be appreciated. Some might say, "Well, this is all part of being married. This is what is expected of my spouse"! The question is, "Why"? Where is it written in the marriage contract that they HAVE to do this because they married you? This is an expectation— be it societal, cultural, or personal— it's still an expectation. So why not express thanks from time-to-time that your spouse actually does it? Some spouses don't and won't do it.
- Thank them for being dependable and honourable. When we have a spouse who is dependable and obviously honours the marriage commitment it would be nice to let them know you appreciate who they are and how they make their choices to honour your marital partnership. Realize that you're blessed to have a spouse who is a "Promise Keeper." Now let them KNOW you realize it by thanking them.
- Thank them for the little things they do that may have gone unnoticed in the past like: cooking, changing a light bulb when it's burned out, or filling the automobile with gasoline when it needs it... Those are just a few things for which you can thank them. But go ahead... think of others. And then *express* your thanks. Being thankful is great. But sometimes we need to also verbally express it.

We've known of marriages where the spouse has left the other for someone else because they said they felt "unappreciated" or "taken for granted" and eventually found someone else who lavished their appreciation upon them or have made them feel needed and "special" again. We're not saying it is right for them to have done this, because it is not.

A HYMN FROM A GRATEFUL HEART

Imagine a man conducting forty to fifty funerals a day, burying nearly 4500 people in all. Among those dead was his wife. Towards the end, the deaths were so frequent that the bodies would just be placed in trenches, without burial rites.

Imagine also that this person would be so thankful even in such a grim situation that he would write a hymn that would be sung by Christians 300 years later all over the world. It is unbelievable, isn't it?

Not if you're describing Martin Rinkart, a Lutheran pastor of Germany during the Thirty Years' War. During that period, rival armies from across Europe roamed through his parish in his native Saxon village of Eilenburg. It was a walled city, the walls being the reason it was a place of hiding for thousands of refugees. To make matters worse, the village was struck with the plague in 1637. More than 8000 of the inhabitants perished, and Rinkart himself buried 4,000 of his parishioners, some days conducting mass funerals for as many as 50 a time. In the midst of this terrible plague, and the severe famine that came in its wake, the Swedish forces that were occupying Eilen burg demanded a tribute of 30,000 thalers from the stricken inhabitants. Rinkart appealed to them and managed to reduce the sum to 2,000 thalers. He also appealed to the Almighty, telling his parishioners, "We can find no mercy with men; let us take refuge in God." All other officials and pastors fled, leaving Rinkart alone to care for the dying. The experience of Rinkart did not take away from him a heart of gratitude to our loving God! The hymn he composed was: "Now Thank We All Our God, With heart and hands and voices. Who wondrous things hath done, In whom his world rejoices; Who from our mother's arms, hath blessed us on our way, With countless gifts of love, And still is our today." (I encourage you to look up the rest of the hymns). Rinkart has demonstrated that our gratitude to God should not depend upon our circumstances but on the assurance of God's love, His sovereignty, and His Word.

A true Christian is a man who never for a moment forgets what God has done for him in Christ, and whose whole comportment and whole activity have their root in the sentiment of gratitude.

tinue: "The person of whom I am speaking, of course, is Jesus Christ. And here to tell you about Him is my friend, Dr. Norman Vincent Peale."

There came life and there came future. No matter how hard circumstances seem to be, there is never a time in the life of a child of God when he ought to conclude, "That"s it! I quit!
